

## **40<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Celebrating Excellence in Education**

In celebration of Herkimer County Community College's 40<sup>th</sup> anniversary, and in honor of the many people who made the College what it is today, the Connections alumni magazine staff solicited feedback from current faculty and staff, as well as emeritus faculty, to learn what they enjoyed most about HCCC, significant changes they've witnessed over the years, and their fondest memories of HCCC. As space limitations kept us from including all responses in the inaugural issue of Connections, we share them with you here.

### **Laura J. Webster '71, Associate Professor, Emeritus, Science**

"I was an adult student at HCCC in 1968 (part-time, evening) and from 1969-1971 (full-time). During my student years, the College was in the factory building in Ilion. All the classrooms, labs and library were on the second floor. Even though the physical plant was primitive compared to the College today, the faculty and staff were top-notch. I truly believe the quality of my education at HCCC was superior to that at any of the colleges I attended later. I was very pleased and proud to join the science faculty at HCCC in 1973 as a colleague. I was very proud of HCCC in the beginning years because the whole staff was student and academically oriented."

“When I arrived at HCCC in 1972, we had a new program in data processing. The computer was a donated Mohawk Data Sciences (MDS) 2405, with card input, two nine track tape drives for external storage and a 300 line per minute printer. The only language available on this hardware was Mohawk Data Language (MDL), a subset of ANS Cobol.

“For the first year we used the computer facilities at Special Metals Company in New Hartford. I would drop trays of cards off for processing each evening and bring them back to the College in the morning. From these humble beginnings grew the present day Technology Center with its computer labs, offices, DEC computer systems, etc.!”
