Dr. Ann Marie Murray serves as the third president of Herkimer County Community College, a position she has held since August 11, 2008. President Murray has an extensive background in higher education and mathematics education, both as an administrator and as a faculty member. She comes to HCCC from Broome Community College where she served as vice president for academic affairs since 2005 and was responsible for the oversight of all academic programs and academic functions of the college, including the schools of business and public services, liberal arts, health sciences and science, technology, engineering and mathematics; continuing education; international education; learning resource center; teaching resource center; and online learning.

Dr. Murray also spent many years at Hudson Valley Community College where she held the positions of dean of business and engineering and industrial technologies, associate dean of academic services and department

chair for mathematics and science and engineering science. She also taught mathematics at Hudson Valley for 19 years, having moved up in rank from an adjunct to full professor. While at Hudson Valley, she received the Excellence in Teaching Award, the President's Award for Service, and the prestigious SUNY Chancellor's Award for Excellence in Teaching.

Dr. Murray holds a Bachelor of Arts in Mathematics from Mount Saint Mary College, Newburgh, NY and several degrees from the University of Albany including Master of Arts in Advanced Classroom Teaching, Master of Science in Instructional Technology, Certificate of Advanced Study in Education Theory and Practice, and a Ph.D. in Curriculum and Instruction.

Dr. Murray is originally from Poughkeepsie, NY. She and her husband John share five grown children and reside in the village of Herkimer.

College's Third President is Optimistic for the Future of HCCC



Herkimer County Community College President Ann Marie Murray describes her arrival and first few months on the job with one word— exciting. Dr. Murray officially began her tenure as the College's third president on August 11. "I have never felt so welcomed. It was amazing," she said. Murray said she has been most impressed by the sincerity and competence of the faculty and staff. "There's a very real, honest, genuine, quiet competence around every corner I turn. The people here are focused on doing the job that needs to be done."

Murray's career in higher education began as a part-time mathematics teacher at Hudson Valley Community College, from which she moved into a full-time tenured track position and continued to be promoted through the ranks, ultimately to professor. After 19 years of teaching, Murray moved into administration and served in various academic leadership posts at Hudson Valley. In 2005, she became vice president for academic affairs at Broome Community College where she was responsible for the oversight of all academic programs and academic functions of the college.

For Murray, the biggest adjustment in becoming a college president was not the enormous workload or the extremely demanding schedule, but rather the constant exposure and visibility. "I've always been a high producer and have worked at this pace, but most of my work previously was behind the scenes."

Murray took on the top position at Herkimer during a challenging time for the institution. On her plate were several issues including dealing with decreases in state funding and the effects of a troubled economy, as well as addressing and settling some of the issues that resulted from a rather tumultuous transition in administration. Murray admits she does not have all the answers, but she is confident she can bring the right people together to focus on solutions.

The first few months on the job have been a whirlwind of meetings with faculty, staff, trustees, Foundation and alumni

boards, community members and government officials. She is in the process of meeting individually with each faculty member, and takes every opportunity to meet with various constituents including students, alumni and community members. "I want to find out what we are doing right and what we need to change," she said. "As the new leader here, it is my job to find out what the College and community need." Murray's short-term goal is to identify the direction or vision in which to lead the College, after which a strategic plan will be developed with benchmarks and assessment built in.

The College is currently undergoing an intensive Middle States Association reaccreditation review process. Social Science Professor Mary Jo Kelley is the committee chair for the Middle States review, and she credits Murray with being "very tuned into the institution in a short time." Kelley said "She is very supportive and encouraging and seems very focused on improving student learning outcomes and assessment."

HCCC Student Government Association President Alysia Fernandes, Herkimer, has had several opportunities to interact with Murray and says she has been inspired. "As a female student, I personally like that she is a woman," said Fernandes. Referring to some of the issues addressed by Murray, Fernandes said "It is amazing what she has done in just a few months. People really respect her." As a student leader, Fernandes is especially pleased with Murray's involvement with students and her interest in the Student Government and Faculty-Student Associations. "I think she will provide student leaders with many opportunities."

President Murray made her commitment to the College and community very clear when she and her husband, John, a retired

mathematics professor, purchased the former "Putnam Manor" in the Village of Herkimer. "It is important to me to be a part of the community." She has become actively involved in a variety of community organizations including the United Way and the Genesis Group. She takes advantage of all opportunities to meet and work with community and business leaders, as well as government officials. In an effort to help the local community meet her, she has accepted numerous media interview requests including 'The Joe Kelly Show' and 'Community Forum,' a public interest show produced by SUNYIT.

The Murrays have been married 18 years and share five grown children and three grandchildren. A product of a traditional Italian family, Murray has a special flair for cooking, particularly homemade pasta. When her children were young, she enjoyed making her own baby food, making homemade pizza (starting with yeast) and knitting children's clothing. This creative and back-to-basics approach is really no surprise, as Murray says she is intrigued by how things evolve. "I am fascinated with form and function, how things work and how they are made, and the human element involved."

Throughout its 42-year history, HCCC has been a leader in many areas including online learning, athletics and academic programs such as Radio-Television Broadcasting and Travel and Tourism. President Murray's hopes and plans for the future of HCCC include creating and supporting new and existing areas of excellence and finding niches that help define the institution. "I am looking for the faculty to identify or create programs that have the potential to define us or to bring us to another level of prominence," said Murray. "For me, it is important that everything we do is as high quality as possible, has integrity and really reflects who we are."

Recent Grad Finds Career Field Rewarding

Beau Babcock, Physical Therapist Assistant

When Beau Babcock graduated from Herkimer County Community College in May 2008, he knew he wanted to use his Physical Therapist Assistant A.A.S. degree to improve the quality of life for others.



When Beau Babcock graduated from Herkimer County Community College in May 2008, he knew he wanted to use his Physical Therapist Assistant A.A.S. degree to improve the quality of life for others. “After serving four years in the U.S. Army in Iraq and Afghanistan, I wanted to get an education in a field that would allow me to help others. In the military, I started lifting weights and became intrigued by how you could work your body. That led me to pursue a career in physical therapy.”

Babcock, who resides in Earlville, NY with his wife Claudia and four-year-old daughter Brooklyn, works as a traveling physical therapist assistant in Pennsylvania. “After graduation from Herkimer, I passed my New York state boards and began looking for employment. I found better opportunities out-of-state, so I applied for a Pennsylvania license.” He is employed by MDI Medical, a recruiting agency for health professionals. Known as a leader in allied travel staffing, MDI provides national opportunities for allied healthcare professionals, specializing in physical therapists, occupational therapists, speech language pathologists and imaging/radiology professionals. They assist healthcare facilities in providing quality patient care when they require additional staff. Babcock’s current 13-week assignment is with Allied Services Rehabilitation Center in Scotrun, PA. Upon completion, his current contract will either be renewed or he will be reassigned to another facility.

Babcock provides physical therapy to patients suffering from injuries, chronic pain or illness. “I provide therapy that will hopefully improve quality of life, and make patients more comfortable in the tasks involved in their daily lives,” he said. His patients range from children who have survived cancer to elderly stroke patients and amputees. “When I see patients are on the road to recovery, it is very rewarding,” Babcock said.

Besides the specific physical therapy instruction he received at HCCC, Babcock said the “warmth and caring” he felt while attending Herkimer is something he hopes he passes on to his patients. “Everyone was very caring, from the office staff to the professors. When I passed my professors in the hall, they recognized me and would ask how I was doing. When I had problems with my GI Bill benefits, Registrar Craig Dewan was a big help,” he said.

“The faculty at Herkimer really work with the students, and because of that I feel I received a better education,” Babcock said. “The PTA program itself can’t get much better. Going from the classroom to the working world, my experience at HCCC prepared me well. I’m glad I was in a program with high values and quality control,” he added. He credits his PTA program faculty, Catherine DeLorme and Karen Jones, with providing excellent preparation for entering the profession as a physical therapist assistant.

Assistant Professor and PTA Program Director Catherine DeLorme said “Beau is a remarkable individual and was a pleasure to have in class. He was always prepared and strove to comprehend and master the material. This mastery showed when he excelled in the board exams after graduation. His bearing and demeanor inspired his classmates. He went above and beyond to promote the program including driving over an hour on his day off to be on campus to participate in ‘photo day,’” she added.

Babcock also enjoyed classes with Professor of English Dick Friedrich. “He’s very down-to-earth, and reminds me of my father,” Babcock said. “He helped me learn to analyze and become a better writer.” Friedrich said “In just about every class, Beau would hear one idea that really struck him; he’d wait patiently after class and then come to me to pursue it further than we could in class. He definitely is one of those

students who craves learning—my class had nothing to do with his vocational plans; he simply learns because that’s who he is.”

While Babcock’s current travel job puts a strain on his family life, it doesn’t compare to when he was overseas in the Army. “Our wedding almost didn’t take place as planned in 2002. I had to drive home on a Friday from Fort Bragg, North Carolina, get married on Saturday, and return on Sunday as we were about to be deployed to Afghanistan,” he said. “With the current state of the economy, I felt I had to take my best employment offer. My wife has a stable job teaching at Sherburne-Earlville Elementary School, so we didn’t want

to move,” Babcock, a self-proclaimed “country boy” said. The couple has known each other since childhood. In addition to his coming home each weekend, they meet each other part way in Binghamton, NY once a week to spend time as a family with their daughter.

Babcock said “I plan to keep traveling for the time being, then once we have more children I’ll look for a permanent job closer to home.” The couple plans to purchase land where they can raise their children and teach them morals and ethics that will set them up for future success. “I set my goal three and a half years ago to graduate from college as a physical therapist assistant and get a job in the outpatient setting. I have now reached that goal and my wife and I are in the works of setting new goals,” he added.

His professors at HCCC feel he will accomplish his future goals as well. Dr. Karen Jones, PTA Instructor said “I truly enjoyed having Beau in class as he is a very determined individual who is caring and compassionate to others. I am confident his personality and knowledge base will take him far in the Physical Therapy profession,” she added.

Men's Soccer Team Wins 20th Regional and 7th National Championship Titles

HCCC's men's soccer team again won the Region III championship this fall for a total of 20 regional titles in 21 years. They went on to compete in the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) National Championships in Richland, Texas where they came from behind in consecutive games to capture the national championship. It was the seventh national

title for the Generals and the fourth for head coach Pepe Aragon. In the championship game, the Generals defeated Triton College by a score of 2-1. Making the All-Tournament team from Herkimer was Corey Phillips, Harry Appiah and Sean Trinidad.

Coach Aragon Inducted into Soccer Hall of Fame



Men's soccer coach Pepe Aragon '91 was inducted, as a player, into the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) Soccer Hall of Fame on Friday, November 7 at the NJCAA Division III National Soccer Final Four banquet in Richland, Texas.

As a student athlete at Herkimer, Aragon was a two-time All-American (1989 & 1990) and led his team to a national third place finish in his senior year.

Aragon received an athletic scholarship to NCAA Division I Bowling Green State

University where he was a two-time All-Mid-American Conference selection and helped lead the Falcons to their first NCAA tournament appearance in more than 20 years. After graduating from Bowling Green, he played one season for the Canton Invaders of the National Professional Soccer League. He then signed a contract with the Cleveland Caps of the United States Inter-Regional Soccer League (U.S.I.S.L.) before accepting the head coaching position at HCCC in 1998. In 2000, Aragon was named to the NJCAA All-Century

Team along with former U.S. National Team coach Bruce Arena and MLS goal keeper Zach Thornton.

HCCC Director of Athletics Donald Dutcher said, "I cannot think of a better selection for the NJCAA Soccer Hall of Fame. Pepe has always conducted himself in a first class manner and what he has done for the sport of soccer is immeasurable. We are very fortunate to have him as our soccer coach at HCCC."



Dutcher Named Region III Athletic Director of the Year

Athletic Director Donald Dutcher '90 was recently named National Junior College Athletic Association Region III Athletic Director of the Year. Dutcher was recognized for his commitment to Region III athletics at the fall meeting of the Region III Athletic Directors in Cooperstown, NY. Dutcher serves on several regional committees and has hosted several national and regional athletic events at HCCC.

A 1990 graduate of HCCC, Dutcher was the all-time leading scorer for the men's soccer team, an honor which he held for six years. He was a member of the first-ever team to make the national tournament, and received All-Region honors both years. He earned bachelor's degrees from SUNYIT, where he was also the all-time leading scorer for the soccer team, and SUC at Oswego. He also holds a master's degree and Certificate of Advanced Study from SUC at Cortland. A native of Poland, NY, Dutcher is a 1988 graduate of Poland Central School. He and his family reside in Deerfield.

Dutcher was appointed athletic director at HCCC in 2004. Under his leadership, Herkimer has won nine national and 11 regional championships, and six teams have been named NJCAA Academic Team of the Year. Herkimer placed second nationally among non-scholarship Division III community college athletic programs in the NATYCAA Cup Award in 2008, and earned third place in 2006 and 2007. As a member of the Mountain Valley Conference, Herkimer also finished third in the Region III Directors Cup in 2007-2008. Both awards are given annually to recognize overall athletic program excellence at the national and regional levels.

HCCC President Ann Marie Murray said "This award is a testament to Don's hard work and commitment to his profession. He is a strong leader and is committed to the success of students on the field and in the classroom."

Dutcher serves as president of the Mountain Valley Conference and chair of the Region III softball committee. He is a member of the Region III standards and ethics, women's basketball, women's soccer, swimming, track and field, and men's lacrosse committees. He also chairs the Herkimer County Community College Intercollegiate Athletic Council. He is currently participating in the Leadership Mohawk Valley program.

Dutcher previously was a teacher, coach and athletic director at Poland Central School. Prior to that, he taught at Herkimer High School and coached men's and women's soccer, basketball, track and tennis. He was named Mohawk Valley Coach of the Year in 2004 for leading Poland Central's basketball team to the State Final Four. In 2003, he was inducted into the SUNYIT Wildcat Hall of Fame.



Women's Tennis Player Wins Regional Title

Freshman Robyn Hesse won a Region III championship this fall and was named First Team All-Region. She knocked out the #1 seeded Broome Community College player, Katie Keesler, in the semi-final and then defeated Patti Franczak of Hudson Valley Community College in the final by scores of 6-1, 6-3 to win the sixth flight championship. Hesse won three of HCCC's six points in the tournament.

HCCC Coaches Reach Career Milestones

Three HCCC coaches recently reached milestones in their careers. Aragon has been head coach since 1998 and has led his teams to 12 regional and four national championships. Brelinsky has served as head coach for the women's team since 2002 and led the 2005 team to a Region III championship title. Both were presented with plaques by President Ann Marie Murray and Athletic Director Donald Dutcher '90. Men's basketball coach Matt Lee '01 earned his 100th career victory on November 7 in a 72-67 win over Adirondack Community College. Lee has served as head coach since 2003 and has led his teams to the Region III finals three times.
