Chicago Style - Citing Printed Sources HCCC Library Quick Reference Guide

Please see *The Chicago Manual of Style* (Ref. PN147 .U69 2003) for more information. The Chicago Style supports two citation systems, one for the arts and humanities (the "Notes and Bibliography" system) and the other for the natural sciences and social sciences (the "AuthorDate" system). This guide provides examples for listing resources at the end of a research paper, using both systems. Arts & Humanities (Notes & Bibliography System)

BOOKS

Use the following format:

Last Name, First Name. Year of publication. *Title of work*. Location: Publisher.

Article in an edited book:

PERIODICALS

Use the following format:

Last Name, First Name., and First Name Last Name. Year. Title of article. *Title of Periodical* volume number (issue number): beginning page number-ending page number.
