

# Chicago Style - Citing Printed Sources

## HCCC Library Quick Reference Guide

Please see *The Chicago Manual of Style* (Ref. PN147 .U69 2003) for more information. The Chicago Style supports two citation systems, one for the arts and humanities (the "Notes and Bibliography" system) and the other for the natural sciences and social sciences (the "AuthorDate" system). This guide provides examples for listing resources at the end of a research paper, using both systems. ### Arts & Humanities (Notes & Bibliography System)

#### **BOOKS**

Use the following format:

Last Name, First Name. Year of publication. *Title of work*. Location: Publisher.

Citation Elements:					
Author's Last Name	Author's First Name	<i>Book Title (in italics)</i>	Publisher's Location	Publisher's Name	Year

#### **Book with one author:**

Updike, John. *Self-Conscious: Memoirs*. New York: Knopf, 1989.

#### **Book with multiple authors**

Kerrigan, William, and Gordon Braden. *The Idea of the Renaissance*. Baltimore: Johns Hopkins UP, 1989.

#### **Edited, translated, or compiled book**

Lodge, Henry Cabot, ed. *The History of Nations*. New York: P.F. Collier, 1928.

or

Freud, Sigmund. *Beyond the Pleasure Principle*. Translated by James Strachey. New York: Liveright, 1950.

#### **Article in an edited book:**

Joyce, James. "The Dead." In *The Oxford Book of Irish Short Stories*, edited by William Trevor, 228-266. Oxford: Oxford University Press, 1989.

#### **PERIODICALS**

Use the following format:

Last Name, First Name., and First Name Last Name. Year. Title of article. *Title of Periodical* volume number (issue number): beginning page number-ending page number.

#### Book with one author:

Updike, John. 1989. *Selfconscious: memoirs*. New York: Knopf.

#### Book with multiple authors:

Kerrigan, William, and Gordon Braden. 1989. *The idea of the renaissance*. Baltimore: Johns Hopkins UP.

#### Edited, translated, or compiled book:

Lodge, Henry Cabot, ed. 1928. *The history of nations*. New York: P.F. Collier.

or

Freud, Sigmund. 1950. *Beyond the pleasure principle*. Translated by James Strachey. New York: Liveright.

#### Work in an edited work:

Joyce, James. 1989. The Dead. In *The Oxford book of Irish short stories*, edited by William Trevor, 228-266. Oxford: Oxford University Press.
